"Qualitative inquiries normally take pains to make clear that they are not generalizable" (Kilbourn, 2006, p 534) I disagree that this is or should be the norm for qualitative research in education

Data as Applied to Qualitative Research

One criticism about qualitative research is that it is difficult to generalize findings to settings not studied To explore this issue, I examine three broad arguments for generalizing from data: sample-to-population extrapolation, analytic generalization, and case-to-case transfer Qualitative research often uses the last argu-

Understanding Reliability and Validity in Qualitative Research

causal determination, prediction, and generalization of findings, qualitative researchers seek instead illumination, understanding, and extrapolation to similar situations (Hoepfl, 1997) Qualitative analysis results in a different type of knowledge than does quantitative Reliability and Validity in Qualitative Research
